A Small Book that Packs a Pretty Big Punch

On Sunday mornings we are embarking on a trip through a small book of the Bible. It is a book that is sometimes avoided, I think mainly for two reasons. The first is that this book seems to be somewhat at odds with other teachings in the Bible, especially the writings of Paul. He says in Ephesians 2:8-9, "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith...not by works." In the book we will be going through, the author says, "...a person is considered righteous by what they do and not by faith alone." We will address this seeming contradiction on June 16.

The second reason I have observed that this book is avoided is that it is uncomfortably direct. It deals with issues that we all face on a regular basis and calls us to action. It deals with subjects we would often rather not face; trials, controlling what we say, envy, selfish ambition, submitting to God, humbling ourselves. That is just a sample of the subjects!

So why then would you want to show up for this? I can think of a couple of very good reasons. First of all, this book is uncomfortably direct. That's not a misprint. One of the reasons this book is avoided is a great reason to read it: no fluff, no frills, just direct truth we all need to hear sometimes.

Another reason is that the subjects in this book are the most vital we can address. One question it addresses is "What is saving faith?" What could be more important than knowing that you have saving faith and that your eternity is secure?

Still another reason is that the subjects in this book are extremely practical. The author takes the awesome eternal truths of the good news of Jesus and applies them to our everyday lives. You could literally read this book every day of your life and get additional practical applications each time you read it.

I chuckled at the last Deacon meeting when one of them shared a comment that had been given to him. The person asked him to pass along to me that they wanted more practical applications in the sermons. I thought to myself, "Well there's the confirmation that my next sermon series is the one I'm supposed to do." So show up, buckle up, and maybe wear some steel toed shoes to church because we're going through the book of James.

YOUTH MINISTRY



So I was thinking...

about summer. I remember as a kid summer vacation seemed longer than the school year. Little did I know then that summer vacations would get shorter every year. As we enter this summer, take time out to simply enjoy it. Enjoy being with your first-year college student, your newly graduated high school senior, your junior that somehow needs senior pictures taken soon, or that 8th grader who is suddenly a high school freshman. Take time to soak it all up, because summer vacation is short and before we know it our just graduated seniors will become our first-year college freshmen and will pack up and move out. Are they ready? Are you ready? It's a bittersweet time but hopefully it's exciting too.

There are statistics floating around out there that 70% of incoming college students will walk away from their faith. As a parent and a youth director that is concerning. While I don't have the answer as to how to keep that from happening, (and believe me, I have asked) here are some practical tips to make sure you can say you've done everything in your power to help your student do the opposite.

- 1. Ask them what they feel unprepared for or anxious about. Then be willing to accept their answers. Don't judge, don't get upset. Hear them out and then together work through it. You might be surprised by what they say.
- 2. Ask them how they rank Christian community in importance. They are about to leave a youth group they've known for years. It's comfortable, they know everyone. It's not going to look the same in college but the same type of community exists. They just have to find it. At a recent conference I was told that the first 72 hours of an incoming freshman's year determines whether or not they will succeed at maintaining and growing their faith. This means that they MUST search out Christian community. There are organizations at every campus including CRU, InterVarsity and Navigators. Do a search with your student and find out what organizations are on campus and create a plan for finding them. (Usually campus clubs advertise during the first week.) Encourage and follow up with them about their plans for finding on-campus community. This is a great way for them to meet Christian friends right from the start. (And of all the first year freshman students that I know that have done this, none of them have regretted it and all of them have found friends.)
- 3. Ask them if they want help finding a church in their new community. Go online and research what's available, the locations, and what they offer college students. Then take a Sunday and go visit the church with your student. Help take away the fear of the unknown in every way possible.
- 4. Ask them what they believe and why they believe it. Don't assume you know. Part of becoming an adult is stepping into your own faith and this time of life is usually when it happens. So what do they believe? Do they know how to stand up for their beliefs? Do they believe God's word? Again be prepared for answers you weren't expecting. There is so much going on in their world right now, things we don't understand. Learn about their world so they can come to you when they need help navigating it. Make sure to have a talk about technology. Do they know how to unplug and why they should? What and how do they filter information? Social media and the Internet are great tools, but they are also a cesspool of drivel.
- 5. Ask them if they know how to schedule their time. When I was a teacher I used to show them what a college schedule would look like and I was always amazed at how surprised they were with the amount of "free" time. Remember their frame of reference is an 8-3 style school day with 7 or 8 different classes all back to back. Make sure they know what to do with their "free" time. Cover things like finding time to eat, studying, and work schedules. Help them plan down time and find out their idea for prioritizing time with God.

Watching your child's faith become his own is fascinating. It also comes with moments of mild panic. (Or extreme panic depending on your child.) But it also comes with a new relationship status of friend, one I would not change for anything. Hang in there, get help if you or they need it, and remember two things no matter what: pray for your child and make sure your child knows he or she is LOVED!!

Missionary Spotlight Hunter Swan

Cru with International Justice Mission, Ghana, Africa

Hunter Swan just finished his sophomore year of college, and will be spending 5 weeks (May 28-July 4) as part of a summer mission with Cru to Ghana, Africa.



"I will be going with a group of 17 other college students, from all around the country. While in Ghana, my team will be working alongside an anti-trafficking organization called International Justice Mission ... and an organization that provides aftercare for clients rescued from slavery. Our time in Ghana will have two emphases. The first is working in an aftercare center with young boys rescued from forced labor in the fishing industry on Lake Volta. The work will include education, sports and play, and some social work for those who have a background in that field. We will also be helping to launch and strengthen campus movements in and around the city of Accra.

If God places it on your heart to do so, I would ask that you pray for me. I ask that you pray for this trip to be abundant in spiritual growth, not only for myself but for all those we interact with." *
